Weeding 101

Weeding: removing materials that are no longer relevant to the library's collection

Why should we weed?

- O Increases library appeal
- O Protects readers from inaccurate information
- Encourages browsing
- Eliminates items no longer of interest to patrons
- OSaves space
- O Creates space for updated priorities


Why DON'T We Wed?

As beneficial as weeding is, it's often a neglected part of the Collection Development process. Why is that?

- O It's time consuming
- Throwing books out feels wrong
- Fear of making (or confronting!) mistakes
- Not seen as a priority
- The perception of quantity over quality
- Materials might be "worth something"
- "If we weed all the old stuff, we won't have anything left!"

HOWEVER...

- O It's part of library materials' life cycle
- O It CAN be time consuming when you have to "crisis weed" (just ask Kermit)
- O Interlibrary loan is available for items your library doesn't own
- The best predictor of future circulation is past circulation
- A collection is a living thing and needs to adapt to both the community and the library's priorities (like diversity)



Before You Hit the Stacks: Diversity Audit


- A diversity audit is a way to see who your collection represents
- O How does your collection compare with your community?
- O However, ALL collections should be diverse regardless of community data it is important that we all see diversity
- O Can assess a collection's diversity in terms of:
 - O Authors of color
 - O Main characters of color
 - O Authors/characters identifying as LGBTQ+, disabled, neurodiverse, etc.








MLC's Diversity Audit of Fiction Collection's Nonwhite Authors

- MLC's fiction collection is very small (about 500ish books) and only began four years ago
- Went to the shelves and physically handled each book to assess authors (last names, general knowledge, and author photos helped, as did Google)
- Added up number of nonwhite authors, divided by total number of books on the shelf
- 25.3% of fiction collection is by nonwhite authors
- 74.7% of fiction collection is by white authors

Building a diverse collection is an intentional process.



Thinking about Conducting a Diversity Audit in Your Library?

Follow these steps!

Choose

Choose collection you know you can handle

Decide

Decide what to assess: character or author (ethnicity, neurodiversity, LGBTQ+, disability or chronic illness, etc)

Assess

Assess scientifically, not emotionally: if your collection was super diverse you would probably know. This is a tool for change!

Before You Hit the Stacks: The Analysis

RUN CIRCULATION REPORTS!

- O Divide collection reports into digestible chunks (000s-399s instead of all nonfiction, etc.)
- O Could set parameters to just list books that have only circ'ed once, have never circ'ed, are over 25 years old, etc.
 - Include # of checkouts
 - Last activity date
 - Date of material

The CREW Method

CREW = Continuous Review,
Evaluation, and Weeding


CREW uses a formula to assess collections as well as criteria known as **MUSTIE**:

- Misleading
- O Ugly
- Superseded by a newer edition or a better source
- Trivial
- Irrelevant to the needs and interests of the community
- O Elsewhere (ILL)



The CREW Method

Each Dewey call number is assigned a formula to help you assess the material.



Formula: a/b/c

a = years since the copyright date

b = maximum time since last usage

c = criteria

x = indicates not applicable in any of the positions



133 (Paranormal Phenomena)

10/3/MUSTIE

Books on the paranormal generally receive high use and should be kept until worn. It will be necessary to replace lost and stolen titles regularly since this category includes the popular topics of witchcraft, fortune telling, dream interpretation, and astrology. High use and wear generally ensures that a fresh supply of books is available.

- Numerology: The Magic of Numbers
- Call number 133.335 L
- Published 1969
- Checked out 8 times since 2010
- Last checkout date 2015
- Only book on subject in collection




In most public libraries, general (or popular) fiction is cataloged in a separate area and the 800s are reserved for collections of poetry and prose, literary criticism, and, frequently, works of literature by non-Western authors. See the Fiction section (below) for works of popular fiction.


Copyright is not relevant for literature but older editions that are MUSTIE rarely circulate.

X/3/MUSTIE

Keep basic materials, especially criticism of classic writers. Discard any works of minor writers no longer read in the local schools, unless there is an established demand among the non-student population. Discard older editions of classics that have unappealing covers and yellowing pages, replacing with newer copies or paperback editions. Remember that classics that are being read won't be weeded—don't keep classics just because they are classics!

- Call number 818 O18
- O Published 1969
- O Checked out 5 times since 2010







Common Questions

- What if the recommendation from the CREW Method doesn't make sense for my community?
 - O It's a guideline—you know your community the best!
- What if there's no formula for the call number of a book?
 - O Use your best judgment!
 - O Your library may want to create its own default formula for those titles



Common Questions

- What if we get rid of it and then someone wants it?
- O If you're on the fence about a title's availability for interlibrary loan, check the Beehive Resource Sharing System:
 - Choose any library to search (no need to login)
 - See the holdings of all public libraries in the state
