New Mail Cards

Some of our Books-on-Demand (BOD) patrons may have noticed a new card attached to the mailing card on their cases, and this represents a new quality-of-life feature. One of the advantages of BOD is that the cartridges are reused whenever a patron returns a book, but this also presents a problem for some patrons: neither the case nor cartridge indicates the book's contents. The bookshelf feature (press and hold Play/Stop, Fast Forward/ Rewind to select, Play/Stop to confirm) was previously the only way to identify what books were on a cartridge, but this required putting the cartridge in the machine and then spending the time to listen to each book's title.

From now on, the mailing card that contains the patron's address and MLC's return address will also come with an attached card that lists the first several books on the cartridge. For patrons who receive larger numbers of books per cartridge, only the first few will be listed due to the limited space on the cards. When the patron wishes to return the cartridge, they can either tear the card off or fold it in the reverse direction, revealing the return address. Then, simply drop the case in the mail as normal.

While this feature most greatly assists patrons who are at least partially sighted, it may also be useful for patrons who have sighted caregivers, allowing them to identify which cartridge the patron wants more easily. We hope that this quality-of-life change will make it even easier for patrons to use Books-on-Demand and look forward to new innovations in Talking Books.

Artists will be notified of acceptance, award, or non-acceptance by email.

Top Author:

James Patterson--172 downloads over 6 titles

Knitting and Crochet for the Physically Handicapped and Elderly by Shelagh Hollingworth

Shows how those with limited dexterity can take up knitting and crochet for their own enjoyment. Includes thirty-three knitting patterns and eighteen crochet patterns offering a variety of hats, scarves, gloves, socks, underwear, and jackets, which are easy to put on and take off. 1981. DB17892

Simple Crochet by Erika Knight

Twenty projects for the home from textile designer and fashion consultant. Includes pillows, throws, rugs, baskets, bags, and slippers. Describes equipment and techniques. Step-by-step instructions require only a few basic stitches. 2003. DB58709

Crocheting in Plain English by Maggie Righetti


Commonsense approach to this handcraft that is appropriate for beginners and informative for more advanced crocheters. Covers its history and basic preparations; planning projects and stitch techniques; easy-to-follow lessons; finishing touches; and sensible solutions to nagging problems. 1988. DB54350

Knitting in Plain English by Maggie Righetti

A practical guide for beginning and intermediate knitters. Using a good-humored, common-sense approach, provides patterns and easy-to-follow lessons to complete projects. Offers simple tips to facilitate the process and solutions to frequently asked questions. 1986. DB53868

Learn to Knit Afghan Book by Barbara G. Walker

Explains the beginner's basics—casting on, knitting, purling, and binding off. Provides instructions for some sixty-three patterns combining the basic stitches in various knit-purl combinations: mosaic, slip-stitch, twist-stitch, cable, increase-decrease, and lace patterns. The completed squares are then stitched together to form an afghan. 1997 introduction. 1974. BR13739



Bookshelf Feature

When a cartridge containing more than one book is in the player, pressing and holding down your machine's green, square Play/Stop button will enter the Bookshelf mode. In this mode, the user can select from the books available on the cartridge using the Rewind or Fast Forward buttons. Pressing the Play/Stop button again will exit the Bookshelf on the selected book. The Talking Book machine will remember the book selected even if the cartridge is removed from the player.

Helpful Hints and Reminders

- In order to maintain an active status as a TBS patron, you need to check out or download at least one item each calendar year. Maintaining an active status ensures that you receive this newsletter as well as other updates.
- When calling the Mississippi Library Commission, please identify yourself as a Talking Book Services Patron. This will assist in getting your calls to the appropriate department.
- Please retain the box the digital player arrives in. This box can be used to send the item back if you need a replacement or decide to discontinue service. Do not use tape on the box. The player can be mailed back to the library via the "Free Matter for the Blind and Physically Handicapped" mail program. The free shipping label is marked on the box.
- Please do not write on the containers, cartridges, or the machines. All of our items are recycled and sent to other patrons after each use.
- You do not need to send back the "New Patron Packet" or used headphones. They are both yours to keep.
