

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## Message from the Executive Director

### 'Tis the Season

With the conclusion of the calendar or fiscal year, many public libraries have the task and the opportunity to talk with funding bodies about the successes of the past months and how those successes have supported the needs within the communities served. It is also a time when assistance to achieve the needs of future months are requested with an explanation of the improvements in library services to be expected.

For the Director of the public library, the discussions held are often about long-range objectives and how the communication of a vision can be achieved. The vision shared should have a basis in logic, be a goal of well-being, and support both new and sustaining services.

In any year-end review, there is a need for cost analysis to be sure the library has been efficient in their work. Herein, both the library and its funding agent (Mayor, County Commissioner, or Legislative representative) should review their actions of collaboration (what was accomplished together) and their alliances (maintenance of joint actions and goals on multiple projects and actions). If cooperation is present, all parties will be able to assess situations for the ultimate good.

Some say that libraries are not as needed as they were in decades past. This argument ignores the fact that without libraries, many shall be left in the sphere of ignorance with no source of true and accurate information.

Budget requests on behalf of libraries are a major part of this season. Just as it is a season of giving for many entities, it is a season of giving for public libraries where libraries support the needs of the library patron and the random user. All are welcome in this season of giving!
